

Field Trip Frenzy for February: Logee's

The trip to Logee's Greenhouses will be the first field trip for the 2018 season, and will take place on Monday, February 19th. Our private tour of the many green-houses is scheduled for 11:00 am. The tour will be \$10.00 per person with a \$5.00 "Logee's Buck Back". Their greenhouses are famous for fruiting, rare, and tropical plants, so we know that that \$5 will be put towards good use! After our tour we will stop for a quick bite to eat in or near their location in Danielson, CT. The greenhouses are: the Fern House (dating back to 1892), the Herb House (culinary and Medicinal), the Potting House (Passion flowers, spice plants and bonsais), the Lemon Tree House (citrus and orchids), the Big House (cacti and succulents, as well as geraniums, camellias and clivia), and finally the Long House (blooming, rare, and fruiting plants as well as Logee's famous hybrid begonias.) Their 150 year old orange tree has 10 different grafts, and their "Ponderosa" lemon tree, in residence since 1900, has fruit as large as grapefruits!

Excerpt from our friends at Stockbridge Farm's newsletter:

January 1st brought sad news to us. Our friend, Carol Doerpholz passed on to find another beautiful garden to live in. We met her when we first became associated with the Lavender Association that existed in our county about 20 years ago. She unselfishly contributed her vast gardening expertise, wonderful organizational skills and creative energy, which allowed us to work together to enjoy the beauty of lavender. Time passed and the lavender group disbanded, but we still had many occasions to work together to promote the joys of lavender, flowers, and herbs to anyone who would listen. Of course, we would have meetings so that we could get our ducks in a row, and those gatherings always included some tasty treats. One of Carol's favorites was Swedish Apple Pie. She shared this with us many times, and it was always delicious. Now, in her memory, we share it with you.

Carol's Swedish Apple Pie

5-6 medium apples, peeled, cored and sliced
1 /4 cups sugar
2 teaspoons cinnamon
3/4 cup unsalted butter plus more for greasing the pan
1 cup flour
1 pinch of salt
1 egg
1/2 cup chopped pecans (optional)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Lightly coat a 9 inch pie plate with butter. Mix 1/4 cup of sugar with the cinnamon and sprinkle it over the apples. Mix well and put the fruit into the pan so that the pie plate is about 3/4 full.

Put the 3/4 of a cup of butter into a saucepan and place it over low heat until the butter has melted. Set aside to cool for about 10 minutes. Remove the pan from the heat. Add the remaining 1 cup of sugar, the flour and salt and the egg to the saucepan and mix well. (Stir in the nuts if you are using them).

Pour this mixture over the apples in the pan.

Put the pan in the oven and bake for 45 minutes.

Serve topped with vanilla ice cream. (Ice cream was a food group for Carol, so be sure you have some when you're eating her pie!) Makes 6-8 servings.
