PLEASE NOTE DATE CHANGE FOR THE AUGUST MEETING!
We will be meeting on Thursday, August 28th at 5:30 pm at GCC.

We are delighted that Abrah Dresdale will be our guide as we take a stroll through the net zero greenhouse and permaculture beds at Greenfield Community College. Abrah will be able to tell us about the overall plan for the gardens, and what phase of implementation that they are currently in. She will also be a fount of knowledge about local food programs, especially the relatively new Farm and Food program at GCC. This program provides students with an interdisciplinary understanding of the ecological, economic, political, and social systems as they relate to food and farming. Students can take courses such as Mushroom Foraging and Cultivation, Permaculture Design, Beekeeping, Four Season Farming, Organic Gardening, Food Preservation and Introduction to Food Systems. Since 2011, Abrah has taught Introduction to Food Systems and Permaculture Design at Greenfield Community College. She is the Coordinator of the Farm and Food Systems program, co-advises the Permaculture Club, and serves as the Garden Coordinator for 'Living Laboratory' permaculture garden on campus. As the 2013-14 David Bird Fellow, Abrah traveled to Tamil Nadu, India to help with reforestation and food security efforts. She has taught permaculture design courses at Permaculture f.e.a.s.t., Southern Vermont Permaculture, Wesleyan University, and UMass-Amherst. Abrah uses mentoring and ecological design as tools to facilitate positive change in partnership with people and communities.

Directions: Greenfield Community College is located near the intersection of Interstate 91 and Route 2. Take exit 26 off I-91 and follow the traffic rotary to Route 2 west. Once on Route 2, take a right at the first traffic light onto Colrain Road. GCC is located on College Drive, six-tenths of a mile ahead on the left. Parking should not be a problem this time of day. Choose a place to park (Lot A or E might be closest), and let's plan to meet in front of the greenhouse, which is on the left side of the building as you approach it.

August To Do List

For many gardeners the month of August begins the downhill slide into off season. Warm climate gardeners have a second chance, but some don't have a second wind after summer's heat. Your garden is hardier than you think and there are planet of gardening tasks for August that will keep your flower and vegetable gardens going longer, as well as opportunities to get a head start on next year's garden plans.

- *Seed a fall crop of peas and spinach and keep harvesting. There's always something to make with zucchini.
- *Pick herbs for fresh use and for drying. Harvesting will keep them growing longer.
- *Order spring bulbs for planting and forcing.
- *Check that your mulch hasn't decomposed and add more as needed.
- *Spread a mid-season layer of compost or manure.
- *Keep deadheading and harvesting.
- *Leave some annual seeds to self-sow.
- *Start saving seeds and taking cuttings.
- *Remove any diseased foliage now so it doesn't get lost in the fall leaves.
- *Cut back the foliage of early bloomers like Brunnera and hardy geraniums, to revitalize the plants.
- *Prune summer flowering shrubs as the flowers fade.
- *Take pictures of your garden at peak. Take pictures of container combinations you'd like to repeat.
- *Make sure the cold frame is ready to go.
- *Begin dividing perennials. Start with the bearded iris.
- *Pot up perennial divisions for spring plant swaps. Sink the pots into the ground this fall and they'll be one less chore in the spring.

*Plant trees, shrubs and perennials now, so they can take root, and keep them well watered.

*Get your fall-blooming crocus and colchicum planted so they'll bloom on time.

Note: 1/4 cup is only 16 calories! YES!!! Going to having this ALL #summer long!!! For salsa chop very fine and for a salad make pieces bigger and cut back on the spices and hot pepper.

2 cups finely chopped seeded peeled cucumber

1/2 cup finely chopped seeded tomato

1/4 cup chopped red onion

2 Tbsp. minced fresh parsley

1 jalapeno pepper, seeded and chopped

4-1/2 tsp minced fresh cilantro

1 garlic clove, minced or pressed

1/4 c reduced-fat sour cream

1-1/2 tsp lemon juice

1-1/2 tsp lime juice

1/4 tsp ground cumin

1/4 tsp seasoned salt

Tortilla chips (For salsa)

In a small bowl, combine the first seven ingredients. In another bowl, combine the sour cream, lemon juice, lime juice, cumin and seasoned salt. Pour over cucumber mixture and toss gently to coat. Serve immediately with chips or as a fresh salad.

First Wednesdays Speaker Series presents The Politics of Food and Farming August 6, 6-8pm Taken from the Greenfield Library Newsletter Sponsored by the Friends of the Greenfield Public Library with the World Eye Book Shop.

"The Politics of Food and Farming" Ron Krupp

Why is it if we have a surplus of food in this country, farmers have to continue to produce more to stay in business? And why are so many farmers going broke? Why are we facing an obesity epidemic in the U.S.? This talk will focus on such questions as well as provide local and sustainable food solutions through a discussion of community gardening, farmers' markets, canneries, and healthy lifestyle changes. Ron Krupp is the author of *The Woodchuck's Guide to Gardening*, a Vermont organic gardening book—now in its ninth printing—which has sold more than 18,000 copies since 2000, and *Lifting The Yoke*. Ron has been the garden, farm and food commentator on Vermont Public Radio for the past 10 years, and he was the founder of the Brattleboro Farmers' Market in 1972. For the past 15 years, he has coordinated the 3-acre, 165 plot Tommy Thompson Community Garden in the Intervale in Burlington.
